City Manager Introduces Next Fiscal Year Budget

At last Tuesday's meeting, Interim City Manager Steven Falk introduced the draft budget for the next fiscal year, which starts on July 1. The budget Falk presented is mostly unchanged from last year, but does have a few new programs and projects including:

- Add a Second Part-Time Parking Enforcement Officer
- **Restore Library Hours** from 40 to 46 per week
- Improve Code Enforcement by adding Staffing
- Modify Public Works Staffing to Improve Project Inspections
- Restore the Sycamore Avenue Mural
- Remodel the Police Department Restroom
- Develop a Program for Renewing the City's Utility User Tax
- Pursue Grant Funding for the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center (RITC)


The City Council will consider these additions and other budget referrals at its meeting on June 8th and is expected to approve the budget on June 22nd. Presuming Council approves all the above changes, the City will still have \$4 million in operating reserves, which is equivalent to 25% of the annual General Fund budget. This is \$1.5 million above the Council's reserve target goal of 16% of the General Fund.

Planning Division

- Tentatively approved Administrative Design Review Permit #21-19, a request from Kanitra Edwards (homeowner) to replace an existing 400-square-ft. sunroom with a 493-square-foot first floor addition and a second-story balcony at an existing two-story house at 208 Iris Court. (*Final appeal date: Wednesday, June 2, 2021*)
- On May 19, final approved Administrative Use Permit #21-22, a request by Edna Maningas (doing business as "Athan Mia Bakery") to operate a home-based business at 202 Bobolink Way providing baked goods.
- Tentatively approved Administrative Use Permit #21-23, a request by Stella Turner to operate a home-based business at 208 Stone Pine Court offering mobile notary services. (*Final appeal date: Thursday, June 3, 2021*)

The next regular meeting of the Planning Commission is scheduled for June 7.

At its regular meeting on May 25, the City Council adopted an update to the Safety Element of the City's General Plan and the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan.

At its next regular meeting on June 8, the City Council will hold a public hearing to consider an appeal filed by the Olympian Hills Homeowners Association challenging the Planning Commission's May 3 approval of Administrative Use Permit #21-12, a request from Derrick Easterling, doing business as "SOTG Lifestyle," to operate a home—based business providing individual and small group personal fitness training at 105 Hera Road #6. The approved permit allows the applicant to use approximately 400 square feet of an existing two-car garage to provide 1-hour training sessions to up to three (3) clients at a time, an average of four hours per day, 20 hours per week. No outdoor operations or storage of materials and equipment would be permitted. The property is in a Residential Multi-Family Low-Density (RM-L) district.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT



Maintenance & Operations

Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks, buildings, and sewer lift stations. They cleaned up numerous illegal dumping, repaired streetlights, removed litter on roadways, and painted curbs red throughout town. Engie continues to advance

the Energy Generation and Conservation Project. They are currently working on the HVAC upgrades and finishing the solar arrays. The annual janitorial and street sweeping contracts were put out to bid, quotes are being solicited to repair wood railing on the creek crossing on Sycamore and Sanderling, Work on fire breaks has begun throughout town.

Engineering

The public improvements are underway for the Bayfront Development Blocks Q&R including sidewalks, loop road and the abandonment of Linus Pauling. The design plans are also under review for the Sycamore Crossing development project, including the EBMUD relocation of the waterline into San Pablo Avenue. The improvement plans reached 100% completion for the mile long segment of replacement sewer trunk main leading into the Pinole-Hercules Water Pollution Control Plant and the project will be bid out shortly. Design on the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center (RITC) is advancing utilizing \$1.2M in grant funding while the design on the Turquoise Rehabilitation Project is nearing completion. Plan check for a parcel map and grading permit is underway on the Hilltown development. Grading is scheduled to begin this Spring/Summer. The Civic Drive/Sycamore Avenue Pedestrian Enhancement Project is underway. At this time the contractor is waiting for materials that are on order.








<u>Possession of Heroin:</u> On May 11, 2021, at approximately 1:57 pm, Officers were dispatched to Home Depot for suspicious subjects inside the store with 4 to 5 unpaid trimmers in a shopping cart and headed towards the exit. As Officers arrived in the area two males ran through the parking lot, and one was detained while the other ran towards Refugio Valley park and was not located. The subject who was detained was identified as a 26-year-old male out of Union City. He was found to be in possession of a small amount of a substance believed to be Heroin. He was issued a citation and released. The trimmers in the basket were located inside the store near the exit door. (H21-572)

Theft by False Pretense: On May 11, 2021, at approximately 2:55 pm, an Officer handled a lobby detail for a fraud. On May 6, the victim received a phone call from a male subject who identified himself as a detective with Contra Costa County Sheriff's office. The subject told the victim he had a warrant and needed to pay restitution for a sexual assault case in 1987. The victim bought \$8,400.00 in Goggle play cards and ebay cards and provided the male with the information for both. The victim received another call from the male and gave his debit card information at his request. On May 7, the victim received a call from his bank stating someone was trying to make electronic transfers from his account. The victim contacted CCCSO and determined it to be fraud. (H21-573)

Controlled Arrest/Possession of a **Substance/Possession** Paraphernalia/Towed Vehicle: On May 11, 2021, at 12:26 AM, an Officer did a traffic stop on a Silver '06 Chevy Monte Carlo on Willow Ave at Hawthorne Drive for expired registration. The license plate attached to the rear was determined to not belong to the vehicle. The driver was identified as a 39-year-old male from Antioch. He was found to have a suspended/revoked driver's license and to have an outstanding Misdemeanor No Cite Warrant. He was arrested on his outstanding Warrant. The passenger was identified as a 28-year-old male subject who was also from Antioch.
