If you wish to speak at the time of the public comment period use the "raise hand" feature in zoom or *9 if calling in by phone and a staff member will admit you into the meeting to make your comment and at the conclusion will move you back to the "attendee" zoom room. Public comments are limited to 3 minutes. For all City meetings, instructions on the public comment process can be found on the front page of the agenda.

In accordance with Executive Order N-29-20, the public may only view the meeting on television and/or online and not in the Council Chamber. Due to the current health pandemic, Hercules City Hall is closed to the public during Council Meetings, however members of the public can participate electronically by following the instructions on the very first page of each City Council Agenda. Hercules City Hall and Police Department are open to the public during normal business hours with face coverings and social distancing requirements. Normal business hours are Monday-Thursday 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

In compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, if you need special assistance to participate in this meeting, please contact the office of the City Clerk (510-799-8215). Notification 48 hours prior to a meeting will enable the City to make reasonable arrangements to ensure accessibility to that meeting [28 CFR 35.102.35.104 ADA Title II].

Planning Commission

As directed on June 8, 2021, by the City Council, **the Planning Commission will hold a public hearing at 7:00 p.m. at its regular meeting on Monday, July 19, 2021, to reconsider the appeal of Administrative Use Permit (AUP) #21-12, a request from Derrick Easterling, doing business as “SOTG Lifestyle,” to operate a home-based business providing individual and small group personal fitness training at 105 Hera Road #6, within the Olympian Hills Homeowners Association.** The owner proposes using approximately 400 square feet of an existing two-car garage to provide 1-hour training sessions to up to three (3) clients at a time, an average of four hours per day, 20 hours per week. No outdoor operations or storage of materials and equipment would be permitted. The property is in a Residential Multi-Family Low-Density (RM-L) district, whereby home-based businesses are allowed with approval of an administrative use permit, subject to the requirements of Section 13-35.270 of the Hercules Municipal Code. Cheri Cole of Willis Management Group filed the appeal on behalf of the Olympian Hills Homeowners Association.

Bayfront Project Update

- The City has issued a tentative certificate of occupancy for Blocks Q&R (“The Grand”), the new 232-unit apartment complex at 2200 John Muir Parkway, to allow the owners to show model units and the common areas to prospective tenants.

- **At its regular meeting on July 13, the City Council will:**
 - **Receive an update on a draft parking operations agreement between the City and Leducor (Bayfront developer) for the Bayfront project.**

 - **Receive an update from Leducor on the Affordable Housing Plan for The Grand** and direct City staff whether the affordable housing plan satisfies the Bayfront Implementing Development Agreement and project conditions of approval. If so, the City will grant a tentative certificate occupancy that would allow tenants to move in to The Grand.

 - **Receive a presentation from Leducor on a conceptual development plan for Bayfront Blocks A-B-C-D (a.k.a., “The Bowl” / “The Heights”)** and direct City staff regarding a process for considering potential changes to the Waterfront District Master Plan.

 - **Receive a presentation from Leducor and Catalyst Housing Group on a proposed sale of Block N (“The Exchange”) to Catalyst for conversion of the project to middle-income affordable housing and consider authorizing the City to become a member of California Community Housing Agency (CalCHA) Joint Powers Authority to support issuance of tax-exempt bonds for middle-income rental housing created within City limits.**

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Maintenance & Operations

Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks, buildings, and sewer lift stations. They cleaned up numerous illegal dumping, repaired street lights, and removed litter on roadways. Engie continues to advance the Energy Generation and Conservation Project. They are currently working on the HVAC upgrades and finishing the solar arrays. The Household Hazardous Waste event occurred on Saturday June 26 at the Corporation Yard and over 900 cars attended. The restoration work on the railings on Sanderling and Sycamore continued. Weed abate/fire break work was completed by the end of June including along Bayfront in advance of weekend events. An all-way stop was installed at the intersection of John Muir Parkway and Alfred Nobel plus additional 25 mph signs were installed on John Muir Parkway to facilitate speed enforcement.

Engineering

The public improvements are underway for the Bayfront Development Blocks Q&R including sidewalks, loop road and the abandonment of Linus Pauling. The design plans are also under review for the Sycamore Crossing development project, including the EBMUD relocation of the waterline into San Pablo Avenue and hotel. The improvement plans reached 100% completion for the mile long segment of replacement sewer trunk main leading into the Pinole-Hercules Water Pollution Control Plant and the project will be bid out shortly, once permits are received from regulatory agencies. Design on the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center (RITC) is advancing utilizing \$1.2M in grant funding while the Turquoise Rehabilitation Project is out to bid. Plan check is underway for private development projects including the Hilltown development, Franklin Canyon RV Park, America's Tire Store, and the Willow Storage Facility. The Civic Drive/Sycamore Avenue Pedestrian Enhancement Project is under construction.

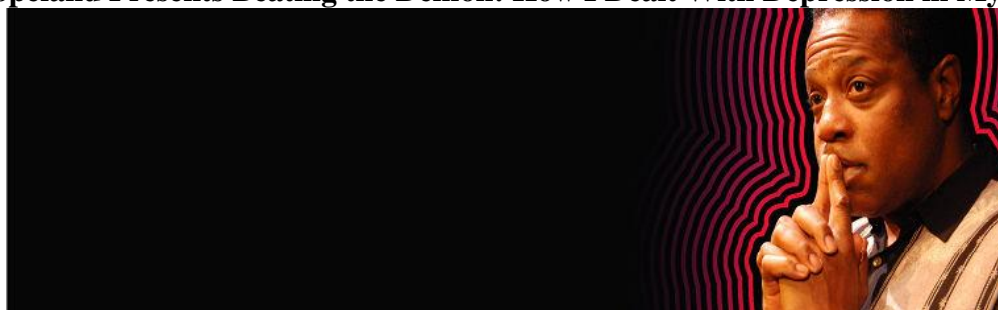

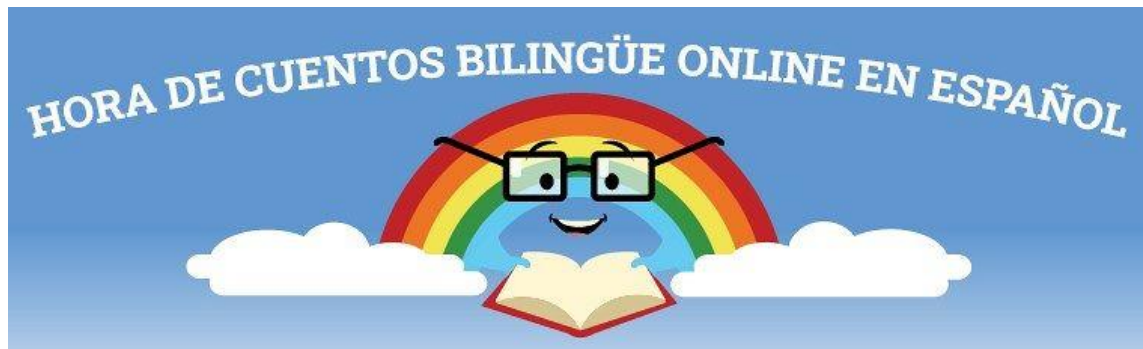

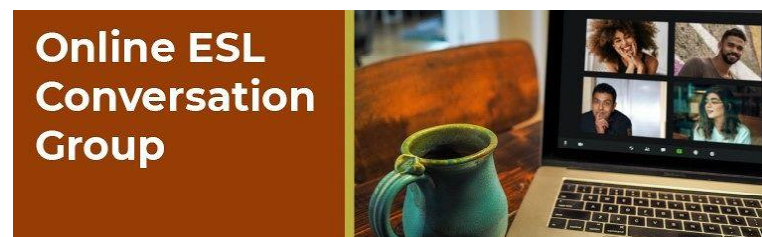
