

Covid-19 Proof of Vaccination or Negative Test Result Required for Some Contra Costa Businesses effective September 22, 2021.



To save lives, prevent hospitals from becoming overwhelmed and keep schools open, we must do all we can now to prevent another surge in COVID-19 cases. Effective Sept. 22, everyone 12 and older must show proof of vaccination or a negative COVID test to enter restaurants, gyms and other indoor businesses where there's an increased risk of spreading COVID-19.

Modified Quarantine Timeline

Modified quarantine is a way for masked, symptom-free, unvaccinated students who were exposed to COVID-19 at school to safely keep going to school. Students can go to school in-person but they cannot go to after-school activities or childcare, even if the activities or childcare



are on the school campus. Students must watch for symptoms for 14 days after exposure and get tested twice: right after exposure notification and again three days later.

Get Tested

Free COVID-19 tests are available at county sites, State sites or other commercial and healthcare provider sites. We recommend getting tested **as soon as possible** if you are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms. Please visit: <u>https://www.coronavirus.cchealth.org/get-tested</u>.

Get Vaccinated

All people age 12 or older can get vaccinated at a CCHS site even if they do not live or work in Contra Costa County, no appointment required. While all CCHS sites accept walk-ins without a previous appointment, people can also schedule an appointment online at <u>https://covidvaccine.cchealth.org/COVIDVaccine/</u> or by phone at <u>1-833-829-2626</u>, Mondays through Fridays from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.



People under age 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian to their vaccination, have written consent from a parent/guardian, or have a parent/guardian we can contact by phone during the vaccination.

Boosters shots of COVID-19

vaccines are currently approved for individuals with immunocompromised conditions (<u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/recommendations/immuno.html</u>). If you are not certain if you qualify, please consult with your healthcare provider.

Community Clean-up Day

The annual Community Clean-up Day was held on Saturday, September 11, from 8-11am at the City's Corporation Yard. Overall, the event was a big success thanks in large part to the great turnout from the City Recognized Nonprofit groups! We'd also like to thank Republic Services for bringing 12 debris boxes out to the event. This year 117 vehicles came through the yard. This number is down from previous years (in 2019 there were 196 cars, and in 2018 there were 216 vehicles). The drop in participation may be attributed to a new date (the event is usually the first Saturday of May), we are still dealing with the pandemic (which may have been a deterrent for some), there were several other events leading up to this event including a mattress event and a Household Hazardous Waste/e-Waste event (where people were able to clean their homes), and this year's Clean-up Day event was held on the 20th Anniversary of 9/11. Regardless, the event produced a great result and was a lot of fun. We were even able to squeeze in a group photo. We plan to hold this event next year on Saturday, May 7, 2022.

Planning Commission – Two (2) Vacancies with terms ending December 2023

The Planning Commission meets the first and third Mondays of every month at 7 p.m. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has statutory duties imposed by State law. The Commission:

- Performs all functions assigned to it by the zoning and design review ordinances of the City.
- Reviews and makes recommendations to the Council on the general plan, specific neighborhood plans, tentative subdivision maps, environmental impact reports, and planned unit developments.
- Reviews the capital improvements program and makes recommendations to the Council.
- Provides design review of proposed buildings and other construction projects and reviews landscape plans.
- Grants use permits and variances.

Finance Commission – **Two (2) Vacancies with terms ending December 2023.** The Finance Commission meets the bi-monthly on the third Wednesday at 7 p.m. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has the following duties:

- Quarterly review of City's financial status; review and comment on audit reports, the proposed operating budget and the capital improvement program budgets.
- Makes recommendations to the Council with respect to budget priorities.
- Advises the Council on matters of policy and public interest related to the management of the City's finances and budget.
- Serves as the Oversight Committee for Measure "A," including providing an annual report, to ensure that utility user tax funds are spent in accordance with the voter approved measure adopted in June 2013.
- Serves as the Oversight Committee for Measure "O," including providing an annual report, to ensure that the sales tax revenues approved by Hercules voters are spent in accordance with the voter approved measure adopted in June 2012.

Community & Library Services Commission – Two (2) Vacancies with terms ending December 2023 (1 Student Commissioner and 1 Commissioner) December 2021.

The Community and Library Services Commission meets on the second Monday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Hercules City Council Chambers located at 111 Civic Drive, Hercules, CA 94547. The Commission is advisory to the Council and has the following duties:

- Develop plans and recommendations for parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, and use of community buildings.
- Work with the Parks and Recreation Department on the development and evaluation of recreation programs and community activities/events.
- Provide assistance and support in the planning and operation of City sponsored community events.
- In cooperation and consultation with the Parks and Recreation Department, make recommendations to the City Council with respect to priorities for recreation, library, and community services expenditures in the City's capital improvement program.
- Review and comment on the annual operating and capital improvement budgets for the Parks and Recreation Department.
- Make recommendations with respect to community service needs such as child care, youth summer employment, senior activities/programs, and recreational programs.
- Review and make recommendations with respect to fees for the use of parks, playgrounds, recreational facilities, and community buildings.

- Advise on matters of policy and public interest related to the management, use and preservation of library facilities and property.
- Render such other specific services as are consistent with the role of an advisory board on the library system, to include recommendations and advice to the county librarian on matters related to the Hercules library.
- The Commission member serving as the City's Area Representative to the Contra Costa County Library Commission shall routinely report to the entire Community and Library Services Commission on actions taken at the Contra Costa Library Commission meetings.
- Review and make recommendations regarding the Arts in Public Places Program and exhibits at the Hercules Public Library.
- Oversee the Heritage Memorial Garden Plaque Program which is designed to recognize Hercules residents or civic leaders and enhance the historical aspect of the garden.
- Oversee the Library Art Exhibition Program which is designed to review art pieces submitted by participants of the program to be allowed to display their art pieces at the Hercules Public Library.
- Such other duties relating to recreation activities and community and library service needs as may be directed by the City Council.

If you wish to speak at the time of the public comment period use the "raise hand" feature in zoom or *9 if calling in by phone and a staff member will admit you into the meeting to make your comment and at the conclusion will move you back to the "attendee" zoom room. Public comments are limited to 3 minutes. For all City meetings, instructions on the public comment process can be found on the front page of the agenda.

• Tentatively approved Temporary Use Permit #21-20, a request by Sylvia Villa Serrano, representing the Hercules Education Foundation, to hold the **2021 Bayfront Run on Sunday, October 3, 2021, at the Hercules Bayfront**. The event will feature 5k and 10k races on an approximately 3-mile portion of the Bay Trail with the Start/Finish line near the intersection of Bayfront Boulevard and Sanderling Drive. The event will also include an outdoor festival with vendors, food trucks, and classic cars outside The Exchange building

at 2525 John Muir Parkway. The event will involve closing portions of Bayfront Boulevard and John Muir Parkway, from Sanderling Drive to Tioga Loop, from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. the day of the event. Residents of The Exchange at Bayfront will still have vehicle access to and from the property throughout the day; however, on-street parking will not be allowed in front of the building during the event. Planning Commission

At its meeting on Tuesday, September 7, the Planning Commission:

- Approved Design Review Permit #21-02 to install a Bloom Clean Energy Server at Bio-Rad Laboratories, Inc., an existing 96,750-square-foot research and development site at 4000 Alfred Nobel Drive in Hercules, CA. The site is in the North Shore Business Park, a Planned Office–Research & Development Mixed-Use (PO/RD) zone.
- Continued to a date to be determined Design Review Permit #21-04 for a 12-ft.-high, 486sq.-ft., free-standing pergola on the rear patio at the Civic Arts Building at 1991 Railroad Avenue in Hercules, CA. The applicant is Mohammed Azam, doing business as "Leila by the Bay" restaurant. The building is owned by the City of Hercules and is on a 1.14-acre site that is part of the Waterfront District and zoned Historic Town Center. The Planning Commission directed the applicant to work with a licensed historic preservation architect on ways to modify the structure to comply with the *Hercules Design Guidelines for Historic Preservation*, and in the meantime, submit a building permit application for Building Code compliance review.

At its next meeting **on Monday, September 20, the Planning Commission will hold a public hearing for the Franklin Canyon RV Resort project**, a proposal to convert the existing Franklin Canyon Golf Course into a recreational vehicle campground with amenities, including a new

10,000-square-foot clubhouse, and approximately 70 acres of open space to be granted to the John Muir Land Trust. More information about the project, including an environmental review document (Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration) is available on the City web site.

City Council

At its meeting on Tuesday, September 14, 2021, the City Council:

Safeway Center

Continued to its meeting on October 26 an appeal of Minor Modification #21-03 for the Safeway Center, located at the northeast corner of the intersections of Sycamore Avenue and San Pablo Avenue in Hercules (4080 San Pablo Avenue). Modifications to the previously approved site plans and designs include:

- Replace bike lockers with bike racks;
- Plant hedges along the east edge of the property in lieu of trees along the east and north edges of the property due to existing underground gas line, retaining wall, and limited space;
- Relocate two trees at northwest corner of the property;
- Remove hanging plants on lights poles; and
- Add designated areas for outdoor sales and displays.

• Bayfront Blocks M/P & O

Called up for appeal, to be discussed at its next meeting on September 28, Minor Modification #21-04 for Bayfront Blocks M/P & O, a request to modify previously approved site plans and designs, including:

- Reducing the total residential unit count for Blocks M/P from 325 to 267;
- Reducing the total residential unit count for Block O from 151 to 120;
- Increasing the size of the building at Blocks M/P from 318,000 to 333,500 square feet (4.9% increase);
- Increasing the size of the Block O building from 103,700 to 107,900 square feet (4.1% increase);
- Increasing the height of certain sections of the Block M/P building on the east elevation (no increase in the maximum height of six stories).
- Minor reconfigurations of windows to align with revised interior floorplans.

On-site parking would remain unchanged (401 spaces for Blocks M/P; 151 spaces for Block O) and would meet minimum parking requirements per the Waterfront District Master Plan (1 space per 1,500 square feet of residential space). The project would provide the minimum number of affordable housing units as required by Exhibit E of the Implementing Development Agreement for the Bayfront Project.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT



Maintenance & Operations

Staff completed their regularly scheduled custodial and facility-related tasks in public parks, buildings, and sewer lift stations. They cleaned up numerous illegal dumping, repaired street lights, removed litter on roadways, cleared vegetation on Claey's lane, removed fallen tree limbs, and repaired signs. Engie is nearing completion on the Energy Generation and Conservation Project. They are currently working on the last item of work, which is the library HVAC upgrades. Staff began inventorying street signs for replacement on private streets. Contract streetlight replacement work in Village Parkway and the gems/birds began.

Engineering

The design plans are under review for the Sycamore Crossing development project, including the EBMUD relocation of the waterline into San Pablo Avenue and hotel. The improvement plans reached 100% completion for the mile long segment of replacement sewer trunk main leading into the Pinole-Hercules Water Pollution Control Plant and the project will be bid out once permits are obtained from regulatory agencies. Design on the Regional Intermodal Transportation Center (RITC) is advancing utilizing \$1.2M in grant funding. Plan check is underway for private development projects including the Hilltown development, Franklin Canyon RV Park, America's Tire Store, and the Willow Storage Facility. The Civic Drive/Sycamore Avenue Pedestrian Enhancement Project is nearing completion while the contact documents for the Turquoise Avenue Rehabilitation Project were executed, with that work scheduled to begin next week.







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Accepted Items

- Electronic waste with circuit boards (including microwaves, computers, TVs, and cell phones)
- Auto products (antifreeze, gasoline, batteries, used motor oil and filters)
- Propane gas cylinders, hazardous aerosols/cleaners/sprays and poisons
- Paints, solvents, thinners, and adhesives
- Household batteries, fluorescent lights, mercury thermometers and switches
- Garden products (pesticides and fertilizers)
- Pool and photo chemicals
- Mattresses and box springs (maximum of 3 items; no excessively wet or damaged mattress; no furniture)
- State regulations limit the transportation of HHW to 15 gallons or 125 pounds per vehicle per visit. Individual containers are limited to a 5 gallon capacity

Prohibited Items

- No garbage
- No furniture
- No business waste, no trailers
- No explosives, ammunition, medical waste, pharmaceuticals, sharps or radioactive waste
- No appliances, including stoves, refrigerators, washers/dryers, vacuums, toasters, coffee makers
- No TVs in consoles or TVs over 36" (flatscreens are accepted)
- No hazardous construction debris (asbestos, pressure treated wood waste, contaminated soil, etc)
- No electric vehicle batteries

Modified Quarantine Timeline



Modified quarantine is a way for masked, symptom-free, unvaccinated students who were exposed to COVID-19 at school to safely keep going to school. Students can go to school in-person but they cannot go to after-school activities or childcare, even if the activities or childcare are on the school campus.

Students must **watch for symptoms for 14 days** after exposure and **get tested twice**: right after exposure notification and again three days later.

DAY 0: Exposure	Student exposed to COVID-19 in a K-12 school setting while both students were wearing masks.
DAY 1 OR LATER: Notification & Test 1	 School informs family of student who was exposed to someone with COVID-19. Student must get tested as soon as possible and give result to school. If student does not have symptoms, they can keep going to school in-person while waiting for test results, but cannot go to after-school activities or childcare.
DAYS 2-7: Go to School, but No After-School Activities or Childcare	 Negative test and no symptoms: can go to school in-person, but cannot go to after-school activities or childcare. Negative test and symptoms: get tested again and stay home and quarantine for 10 days from date of exposure. Positive test and no symptoms: stay home and isolate for 10 days from date of test. Positive test and symptoms: stay home and isolate for 10 days from when symptoms started AND symptoms improve AND fever-free for 24 hours without medication. Not tested: stay home and quarantine for 10 days from date of exposure.
DAY 5 OR LATER: Test 2	 Student gets tested 3 days after the first test and gives result to school. Negative test and no symptoms: quarantine period ends and student only needs to get tested again if they develop symptoms. Negative test and symptoms: get tested again and stay home and quarantine for 10 days from date of exposure. Positive test and no symptoms: stay home and isolate for 10 days from date of test. Positive test and symptoms: stay home and isolate for 10 days from when symptoms started AND symptoms improve AND fever-free for 24 hours without medication. Not tested: stay home and quarantine for 10 days from date of exposure.
DAY 7: Quarantine Ends if Tested Negative	Student can go back to after-school activities on Day 8 if symptom-free and tests negative on Day 5 or later . If student had a late exposure notification, one negative test is acceptable if done on or after Day 5 of their last day of exposure.
DAY 11: Quarantine Ends if Not Tested & No Symptoms	If student never got tested and does not develop symptoms, they can go back to in-person school, after-school activities and childcare after staying home for 10 days.
DAY 14: Last Day to Watch for Symptoms	Student should watch for COVID-19 symptoms for a full 14 days after exposure. If symptoms develop, stay home from school, after-school activities and childcare and get tested.



For free COVID-19 testing, contact your school or healthcare provider. Students must get tested with PCR or antigen tests (at-home tests are not accepted).
